ACCREDITATION

Elmhurst University's master's degree program in entry-level occupational therapy is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA) located at 7501 Wisconsin Ave, Suite 510E, Bethesda, MD 20814. ACOTE's telephone number c/o AOTA is (301) 652-AOTA and its web address is acoteonline.org. Graduates of the

program will be eligible to sit for the national certification examination for the occupational therapist administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). After successful completion of this exam, the individual will be an Occupational Therapist, Registered (OTR).

In addition, all states require licensure in order to practice; however, state licenses are usually based on the results of the NBCOT Certification Examination.

NBCOT Certification - Upon program accreditation and successful curriculum completion the graduates of the program will be eligible to sit for the NBCOT examination to become a practicing occupational therapist. The examination is administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT), located at One Bank Street Gaithersburg MD, 20878, NBCOT's phone number is (301) 990- 7979, web address is nbcot.org.

NBCOT Eligibility - A felony conviction may affect a graduate's ability to sit for the NBCOT certification examination or attain state licensure. For students with a concern in this area, NBCOT can be contacted directly for information related to the Early Determination and Character Review process for approval to take the NBCOT certification examination.

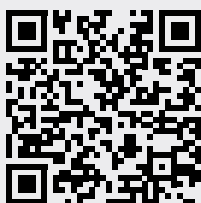


APPLICATION DEADLINE AND REQUIREMENTS

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Admission Criteria

- A bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited U.S. institution or foreign equivalent
- Minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 on a 4.0 scale
- Official transcripts from all institutions attended
- Personal Statement
- Professional Resume
- Three Letters of Recommendation
- A minimum of 20 documented observation hours
- Interview (by invitation only)

Note: The master of occupational therapy program at Elmhurst does not accept transfer credits, experiential learning credits or Advanced Placement credits toward fulfillment of graduate-level coursework required to complete the master of occupational therapy degree.

Prerequisite Coursework:

- Human Anatomy with a lab (4 credit hours) and Human Physiology with a lab (4 credit hours)
OR
- Human Anatomy & Physiology I with a lab (4 credit hours) and Human Anatomy & Physiology II with a lab (4 credit hours)
- Sociology or Anthropology (3 credit hours)
- Developmental Psychology (3 credit hours)
Example: Lifespan Development, Child Development, Adolescent Development, Adult Development and Aging
- Abnormal Psychology (3 credit hours)
Example: Abnormal Psychology, Psychopathology
- Statistics (3 credit hours)
Example: Elementary Statistics, Business Statistics, Social Science Statistics

**Students must have earned a B- or better in all prerequisite coursework and must have completed this coursework within the past 5 years.*
