J-TERM 2021 HONORS COURSES

HON 330 Courage to Change

This course investigated how the historical model of the Niebuhrs (Reinhold, H. Richard, Hulda and Ursula Niebuhr) informs our contemporary self-construction and engagement with social change. The course examined ways their lives speak to us as inheritors of the Niebuhr legacy at Elmhurst University, and the ways our lives speak in response to the ongoing call to social justice.

Dr. O'Rourke's "Courage to Change" course is an engaging month-long discussion about Reinhold Niebuhr's intuitive but well-articulated reflections on the individual-collective dynamic. Niebuhr's theory of responsibility is especially relevant in the current social climate, calling upon the individual to act in the face of inherent finiteness but offering hope for a better tomorrow. Reflecting on Niebuhr's insights on society places one in a better position for processing what is going on and responding appropriately. HON 330 is an eye-opening experience, broadening one's understanding of the interaction of a rage of societal components. - Wiktoria Szymanowicz

HON 329 Intro to Academic Research

The course provides a broad introduction to methods of primary research, surveying and comparing qualitative, quantitative, and mixed approaches, and exploring their concomitant philosophical assumptions. Students in the course conduct and present research, in groups, on various topics




