Students intending to transfer to Elmhurst University should also enroll in courses that will complete requirements of the Elmhurst University Integrated Curriculum (IC, general education requirements). Such courses can be found on the Elmhurst University website (<https://www.elmhurst.edu/admission/transfer-adult-students/>) under “Transfer Guides” or through “Transferology.” Students should have no more than two IC courses remaining for admission to the Department of Education.

Admission to Elmhurst University is not admission to a teacher education program. There is a separate application process. Students with a previously earned associate's degree will receive credit for all Elmhurst University AoKs through the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI). However, students who enter Elmhurst University without an associate's degree should have no more than two of the additional IC courses remaining for admission to the Department of Education.
